Gray Wolf (Created on Day 6)

Design: The gray wolf has a layer of dense underfur that insulates it against the cold temperatures of its habitat. When a female gray wolf digs its den, it digs downward, then upward to prevent flooding. This instinct was given to the wolf by its Creator.

Features: Gray wolves can vary in color from white to dark gray based on where they are found.

A gray wolf usually carries its tail high, whereas a coyote usually carries its tail below the level of the back.

Fun Facts: The entire wolf pack takes care of the pups. They feed and protect them.

Wolves communicate through howling, rubbing chins, and rolling over on their backs. These motions can communicate dominance in the pack, boundaries of a pack's territory, or a call to join in a hunt.

Christian Priorities

There are certain priorities in the Christian life which all believers should have. All of which are important, but some are more important than others. Below are what I believe God has said we should set as our highest priorities, in the order of their importance:

1. Christian devotion to God – our love toward Him, relationship with Him, fellowship with Him. This will manifest itself in different activities we spend our time doing:

- worship
- meditation
- private time
- prayer
- praise

In summary - our love for God is the number one priority:

"Master, which is the great commandment in the Law? Jesus said to him, You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your

mind." (Mat 22:36-37)

Make this your primary focus in life. It comes far before anything else. The greatest joy, experience, reward and purpose in life is to have fellowship with the God of the universe - to be close to Him, and to know Him well.

2. Be concerned for others, not just yourself. This is number two.

"And the second is like it, You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Mat 22:39)

The animals of the earth are all in competition. You see predators in the wilderness all fighting over power, food, shelter, mates, and territory. Most people live this way. The second greatest commandment (and our second priority in life) says that the Christian must live the opposite of the way animals live. Instead of looking out only for ourselves and living to take care of our own – we must care for others as well. We must love them.....
